A NOTE FROM PAT:

Happy July! Many thanks to Michelle for offering to continue our newsletter over the summer. I have news to share, both from our "town meeting" and from our last board meeting. We are all making decisions and providing resources and ideas with the big goal of keeping us all connected as a quilting community, even in the midst of pandemic. Please read emails and the rest of the newsletter carefully so you don't miss a thing!

Going forward, we would like to suggest that members form small working or learning groups. If you have an interest in a special aspect of quilting, gather a group (more on that later) and "meet" via zoom. If desired a small group can meet outside in someone's yard or porch - socially distanced of course! Anyone can be a group leader - just announce the topic and the limit on participants. If you are planning an in-person group, and your porch only holds 4 people 6 feet apart, then say that and confirm with the first 4. The ideas for this are limitless. You could have a

hand sewing party, a group to learn together about trapunto or embroidery and embellishments or some other technique. You could organize a virtual Sew Happy.

And how do you gather a group? The board has voted to encourage people to email the whole guild with anything that is quilt, guild or sewing related. We are going to do this as a trial - please be respectful - nothing about a car for sale or a puppy that needs a home! Only quilts, guild and sewing. We are looking into an easy way for us to email everyone quickly. But for now, open the membership spreadsheet from Deborah Himeloch, copy the email addresses and paste into an email.

One group is already forming - Moira Ten-Hove is leading a group working on a Mystery Quilt Challenge - so read her article about how to get involved. There is also an informal group who are taking an online machine quilting class supporting each other to stay on track and share ideas. One idea is that a group can create a private Facebook group and post photos and questions to each other.

In other exciting news - our guild's exhibit at the quilt museum is being planned. Marianne and Laura are in charge and it's all very exciting. Please check their article for all the details and how you can participate.

Our raffle quilt is getting some splash on the websites of the two food pantries that we are supporting. We've already distributed some funds and hope to raise a lot more. It is every guild member's responsibility to sell their ticket books - or buy them yourself. And then start thinking about where else you can sell them. Post it on facebook, email friends. Here's an idea - I made a lot of masks for friends and family and when they offered to

ACTIVITIES CORNER

Welcome to summer!

This will definitely be a weird one but with most travel plans on hold you may have more time to quilt.

I want to highlight some opportunities in the guild and beyond.

1. About that Mystery Quilt the Guild is running — just \$7.50/person Sign-ups are open until July 10 rsvp to activities@waysidequilters.org

We have a tested pattern — so all the mistakes are yours which I find oddly comforting. As of this writing, **16 intrigued quilters** have jumped in so what are you waiting for? The water is fine.

I'm told that mystery quilts are a new concept to some so I'll try to explain.

You are given the fabric requirements together with some guidance about light/dark/scale/etc.that you can use to pick your fabrics but you can ignore them. You are given cutting instructions — rotary cutters will be used, so no templates or curves. Our mystery offers multiple size options and is scrap-friendly.

Over a period of weeks you receive the "clues" — I'll be sending them out by email given we're still social distancing — which tell you how to create the pieces of the quilt. This is a small element of the larger quilt — half square triangles, snowball blocks, flying geese or similar — that can be accomplished in a fairly short amount of time. Part of the fun is not knowing what you are making.

Subsequent clues may have you assemble these elements to create larger units or the last clue may give the full assembly instructions. Each step is designed to take only a short period of time — you are not signing your summer away.

We'll certainly be sharing photos of the elements and the completed tops — and we are actively encouraging you to share tips with one another.

If you're not sure whether you'll like to finished project, please don't let that stop you. We always need comfort quilts and someone will love it!

Everyone who participates must buy the pattern but that need be your only cost. There is outreach fabric available.

You'll get your copy after the mystery is "solved" and your bill is paid — we're still working on how to receive that safely.

It is really fun to see how different fabric choices alter the final quilt.

2. Always wanted to learn how to free motion your projects? This is free to all but you may want to get a copy of her book for reference.

Lori Kennedy (www.lorikennedy.com) is running a 25 week free motion QAL to accompany the release of her latest book (25 Days to Better Free Motion Quilting) with daily written tutorials (some with videos)

Several - 6 and counting - guild members are participating at some level and we are eager to offer encouragement to everyone so join us.

There is a Facebook group associated with the QAL if that's your thing. More locally, we will endeavor to celebrate our progress, share tips and ideas, and hold one another accountable more personally. There is doodling involved which this art class reject, for one, is thoroughly enjoying.

You may never want to tackle a full size quilt on your sewing machine so why should you learn to free motion quilt? You likely have smaller projects like Wall Hangings, Table Runners, Placemats, Christmas Stockings... Who knows, free motion quilting may be your as-yet-undiscovered superpower.

Finally, figuring out what looks good on smaller projects will really help you with the "Quilt as desired" conundrum.

3. Can't get enough of pinwheels?

Have you seen the deconstructed disappearing pinwheel by Jenny Doan at Missouri Star Quilt Co? She had me with the indigo fabrics then

she added the construction...I want (to make) one!


